Kids to Farms

AgForce has secured Commonwealth funding to help connect primary school children to where their food and fibre comes from. The program will be delivered on behalf of the agriculture industry in Queensland over two years starting June 2020.

The objective of the program is to increase children's understanding of:

- where and how their food and fibre is produced
- the role and importance of agriculture to Australia's way of life, regional communities and the economy.

This project is supported by the Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment through the Australian Government's Educating Kids About Agriculture Initiative.

Project partner Central Queensland University (CQU) will develop resources to support the hands-on activities in the program.

The program is based on the very successful SIPP program- the AgForce School Industry Partnership Program – and will connect students with agriculture through events such as:

- Visits to farms and primary production worksites (e.g. cotton gins, dairies, sugar mills, meatworks, production nurseries, food processors and technology-based facilities) to participate in a hands-on curriculum aligned activities.
- Hosting food and fibre 'mini classrooms' at major events, fair, shows or specific days (Ag Connect) for groups of primary school students where students will be engaged in hands-on experiences complemented with short interactive learning activities aligned to the curriculum. Ag Connect also provide the opportunity for students to engage with a wide variety of agriculture industry professionals and learn about the diversity of careers available in the industry.
- Satellite and virtual technology or other 'in-class' agricultural experiences for primary school students with students who undertake a hands-on, interactive learning experience in agriculture complemented with pre and post experience activities within the classroom more likely to retain knowledge than attending a one-off experience.
- Reviewing and refreshing, or developing resources about food, fibre and the value of agriculture for use in primary school classrooms.
- CQU will develop curriculum-based modules to create a three-phase engagement and learning activity which meets and supports the Australian Curriculum connection to food and fibre. Other activities will create interest, knowledge and understanding of the critical roles of agriculture in the Australian economy, lifestyle and community.
